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Hey West Orange County,

This Tuesday, September 29, 2026, the BCC agenda is shaping up to be a busy one!

A land-use case is currently in litigation against the County. The legal action pertains to the [May 2025 denial](#) in Case No. LUP-22-01-002. Pursuant to Florida law, the Board of County Commissioners is required to consider the Special Magistrate's recommendations in connection with this case.

Micromobility is also returning to the Board for an Ordinance Public Hearing, the safety and well-being of Orange County residents continues to be a top priority for our office. The Board will consider the adoption of an ordinance under Chapter 35 – Traffic regarding Personally Owned Micromobility Devices.

As well as Vision 2050, considering a limited amendment to the ordinance adopting Vision 2050. The amendment would not change Vision 2050 itself, including its goals, policies, maps, Future Land Use designations, supporting analysis, or the Orange Code.

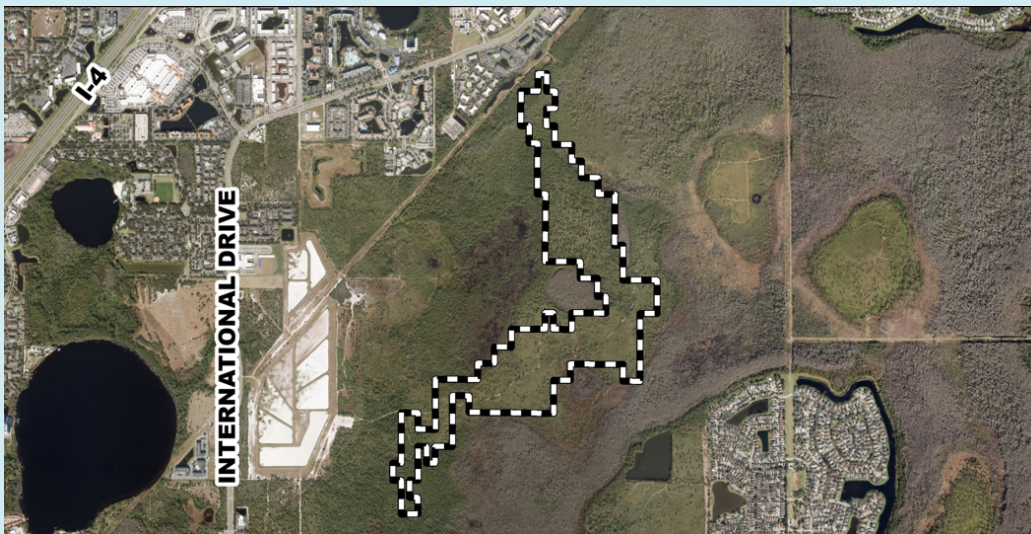

Discussion Item A-1: The Special Magistrate's Recommendation regarding the Tuscana Land Use Plan (LUP-22-01-022) and Conservation Area Impact Permit (CAI-23-05-022) ([Click here for more info](#))



- This Discussion Agenda item requests review, consideration, and a decision by the Board regarding the following two matters related to the property known as Tuscana: (1) the Request for Relief filed pursuant to section 70.51, Florida Statutes (FLUEDRA), and the corresponding Special Magistrate's Recommendation and (2) the Notice of Claim filed pursuant to section 70.001, Florida Statutes (Bert Harris Act). As to the FLUEDRA Claim, the Board's statutory options are: a) accept the Special Magistrate's Recommendation and implement such recommendation, by approving LUP-22-01-022 and CAI-23-05-022; b) modify the Special Magistrate's Recommendation and implement such modified recommendation; or c) reject the Special Magistrate's Recommendation.
- As to the Bert Harris Claim, the Board's statutory options are:
- a) make a settlement offer to approve the LUP/CAI and issue a corresponding statement that the allowable uses to which the Property may be put are those consistent with the approved LUP/CAI;

- b) make a settlement offer and issue a statement of allowable uses corresponding to the modified relief approved by the Board; or
- c) make a settlement offer of no change to the County's action and issue a corresponding statement identifying the allowable uses to which the Property may be put under the existing A-2 zoning districts and other applicable regulations.

Public Hearing G-9: Micromobility Device Ordinance [\(Click here for more info\)](#)

Orange County is proposing updates to Article VII and Article VIII of Chapter 35 of the Orange County Code of Ordinances micromobility ordinance to address the unsafe or unlawful operation of electric bicycles, motorized scooters, and other micromobility devices on public rights-of-way, which can endanger pedestrians, motorists, micromobility device operators, and other users of those facilities.

The proposed amendments would establish clearer standards for the safe operation and parking of micromobility devices, strengthen enforcement tools and penalties for careless or reckless operation, require helmets for minors, and allow for impoundment when appropriate.

Supporting micromobility aligns with the County's Vision Zero policy and advances public health and sustainability goals by producing little to no emissions and encouraging more active travel; however, increased use is also contributing to safety and quality-of-life concerns, including rising

complaints and crash incidents, particularly among youth, driven by infrastructure gaps, higher operating speeds, inconsistent regulations, and limited enforcement and public education.

The changes aim to balance the benefits of micromobility, including affordable transportation, support for our local economy, and reduced vehicle trips, with the County's commitment to Vision Zero and safer roads for everyone.

Ordinance Public Hearing Item G-8: Vision 2050 Adoption ([Click here for more info](#))

- Vision 2050 lays out the blueprint for Orange County's growth over the next three decades, while Orange Code establishes the development guidelines needed to bring this vision to life. Together, Vision 2050 and Orange Code will shape a smarter, more sustainable future for Orange County.
- Following the Board's June 3, 2025, adoption of Vision 2050, FloridaCommerce issued a "null and void" determination based on SB 180. In response, during the July 14, 2026, BCC Work Session, the County initiated an ordinance amendment to address the State's determination.

- On September 29, Orange County is considering a limited amendment to the ordinance adopting Vision 2050. The amendment would not change Vision 2050 itself, including its goals, policies, maps, Future Land Use designations, supporting analysis, or the Orange Code.
- The proposed change would clarify that Destination 2030 remains the operative Comprehensive Plan until Vision 2050 takes effect and it will create a temporary, voluntary option for certain qualifying private applications to be reviewed under the Destination 2030 provisions until Vision 2050 becomes effective.
- **If adopted, the amendment would be sent to FloridaCommerce as a supplement to the Vision 2050 adoption package. Under the current projected timeline, Vision 2050 could become effective December 21, 2026. Qualifying property owners would have until September 30, 2027, to elect review under the applicable Destination 2030 provisions.**

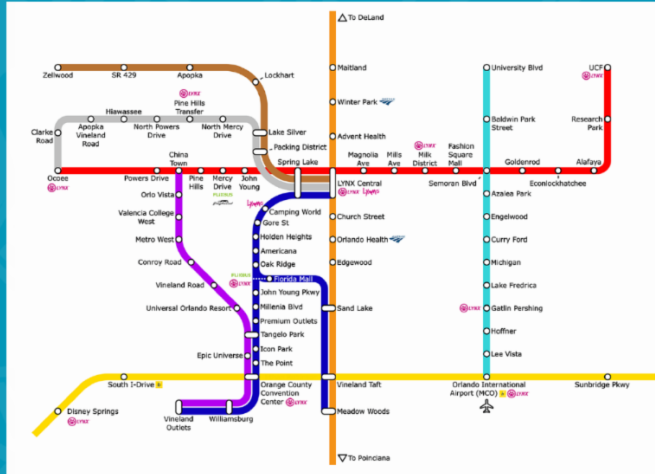

Discussion Item B-1: Commissioner Martinez Semrad would like to discuss a Sunshine Transit Advancement Resolution (STAR) Ordinance. ([Click here for more info](#))

- In response to the need for further investment in public transportation infrastructure, Commissioner Semrad would like to propose the codification of the citizen-led Sunshine Transit Advancement Resolution (STAR) Ordinance in Orange County.
- This initiative aims to establish a framework for Orange County to study, secure funding for, and develop countrywide rapid transit infrastructure for eight (8) high-volume transportation corridors. She is seeking Board feedback and direction to evaluate the STAR Ordinance, create a continuous district a half-mile from STAR-designated corridors that will collect money through Tax-Increment Financing (TIF) districts, and create a Citizen's Rapid Transit Trust Fund to be overseen by a citizen's oversight committee.

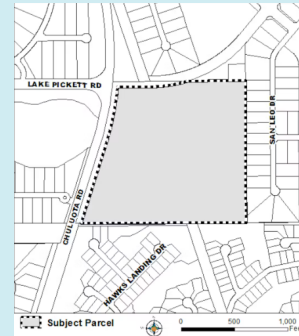

Public Hearing Item D-5: Chuluota Road Agricultural Enclave Certificate Determination ([Click here for more info](#))

- **Applicant: David E. Axel**
- Orange County has received an application involving property generally known as Chuluota Road in District 5. The applicant has asked the Orange County Board of County Commissioners to certify the property as an Agricultural Enclave under Florida law (known as Senate Bill 686).
- At the hearing, the Board will consider the application, the County's written report, information presented by the applicant, and public comments before determining whether the application satisfies the statutory requirements for Agricultural Enclave certification.
- The hearing is limited to determining whether the property qualifies for Agricultural Enclave certification under Florida law.
- There is no development program at this time. If approved, Agricultural Enclave certification would allow the property owner to later submit plans for single-family residential development at a density equivalent to one or more adjacent properties or an adjacent development, as provided by Florida law.



Public Hearing Item E-6: Rural Settlement Utility Connection Determination ([Click here for more info](#))

- **Applicant: Hal Kantor, Lowndes Law**
- This request was continued from the September 15th Board hearing. The owner of a property in the Bithlo Rural Settlement desires to connect to the potable water line that is across from E.

Colonial Drive in front Of their property. Policies WAT 1.4.3 and WAT 1.5.3 are a guide for how utility connections in the Rural Settlements can be achieved. The applicant has applied to be reviewed under WAT 1.4.3 which allows the Board to make a finding Of a public health hazard and allow connection. However, the policy references "existing development".

- The subject property was previously developed as a storage yard for inoperable vehicles. The use was discontinued and the related structures were demolished. The owner is pursuing the same use currently with a new structure. Staff considers the development to be "new development" and therefore recommends denial Of the request due to the inconsistency with the Comprehensive Plan policy that speaks to "existing development" only. Since this is a policy decision only related to utility connection, a community meeting was not held.



Ordinance Public Hearing Item H-10: Adopt final OC Library District Millage and Budget for Fiscal Year 2026-2027 ([Click here for more info](#))

- The Board of County Commissioners will convene as the Orange County Library District Governing Board to adopt the Library District's annual millage rate and budget.
- The Library District is funded primarily through a dedicated property tax that supports the operation of the Orange County Library System and its branches, programs, collections, and services.
- The proposed Library operating budget for FY 2026-27 is \$117,603,120 with the millage rate set at 0.3748. The millage rate and budget are reviewed annually as part of the public budget process.
- The District 1 Branches are Horizon West (coming soon), Southwest, Windermere, and Winter Garden.
 - **The Budget Public Hearing will be held in the Commission Chambers at 5:01 p.m.**

Consent Item B-1: Approval and execution of Agreement between Orange County, Florida and Winter Garden Art Association, Inc. (Winter Garden Art Museum) in the amount of \$4,000,000. ([Click here for more info](#))



- On September 27, 2024, the TDC recommended the funding request to the Board. Then, on October 29, 2024, the Board approved the funding request recommended by ARC and TDC and directed staff to develop funding agreements. The Winter Garden Art Association, Inc. (Winter Garden Art Museum) has executed the agreement, which will allow The Winter Garden Art Association, Inc. (Winter Garden Art Museum) to access these previously granted funds which were Board approved. The use of TDT revenues for auditoriums and museums is authorized pursuant to section 125.0104(5)(a)1.b. and c., Florida Statutes, respectively. If approved, the Comptroller will disburse TDT funds in accordance with the terms of the funding agreement.

Consent Item C-4: Median Modification Improvements for Town Center Boulevard at Hunters Creek Promenade, Town Center Boulevard at Place Boulevard, Curry Ford Road at Lamberton Drive, and Lake Underhill Road at Rocking A Run, Modular Roundabout Design with Vanasse Hangen Brustlin, Inc., in the amount of \$72,263.91, for a revised total amount of \$513,586.55. ([Click here for more info](#))

- This amendment authorizes additional professional engineering services for Median Modification Improvements for Town Center Boulevard at Hunters Creek Promenade, Town Center Boulevard at Place Boulevard, Curry Ford Road at Lamberton Drive and modular roundabout design at Lake Underhill Road at Rocking A Run, utilizing the existing intersection footprint of Lake Underhill Road at Rocking A Run. This amendment will add \$72,263.91 to the total task authorization amount for a revised total of \$513,586.55. This project is in District 4.

Consent Item D-1: Florida and The School Board of Orange County, Florida Related to Meal Services at 13 Head Start sites for the period of October 1, 2026 through September 30, 2027 with no cost to the County. ([Click here for more info](#))



- Orange County Public Schools (OCPS) shall furnish meals daily from October 1, 2026 through September 30, 2027, except for holidays or days of Center closure. OCPS will prepare unitized meals for breakfast, lunch, and snack, maintain required meal pattern standards, provide meal counts in advance, and invoice the County within 30 days. The County will request special diet meals with appropriate notice and will process payments in accordance with Florida Prompt Payment statutes.

Consent Item D-2: Low Income Pool Letter of Agreement by and between Orange County on behalf of Aspire Health Partners and the State of Florida, Agency for Healthcare Administration in the amount of \$4,034,459 through the Intergovernmental Transfer Program. ([Click here for more info](#))



- For the past 26 years, the Intergovernmental Transfer Program (IGT) has been the primary funding mechanism for Orange County's Primary Care Access Network (PCAN). The IGT program allows the county to draw down additional state and federal dollars for PCAN by participating in the Medicaid Low Income Pool (LIP). LIP funds are intended to assist in providing health services to uninsured, underinsured, and Medicaid patients.

Consent Item D-3: Affiliation Agreement between Orange County, Florida and Inter American University of Puerto Rico, Inc. related to Experiential Learning Placement Program and authorization for the Mayor or designee to execute any amendments to this contract. ([Click here for more info](#))



- Inter American University of Puerto Rico, Inc. provides accredited programs within various fields of study, such as social work, and requires that students enrolled within those programs obtain “real world” experience. Orange County has served as a host agency for these interns, and Inter American University of Puerto Rico, Inc wishes to secure experiential learning placements for their students in the Community and Family Services Department. The Agreement establishes an Experimental Learning Placement Program to facilitate the placement of their students in our programs to ensure that those placements are done in a manner that is beneficial to both the College's program of study and County operations. The term of the Agreement shall remain in effect from the date both parties execute the agreement through September 30, 2029. There is no cost to the County.
